Who We Are?

Nagarik Aawaz (NA) is a non-governmental organization dedicated to promoting peace. We founded, the NA in 2001, at the height of the armed conflict (1996-2006) in Nepal. In more than two decades, the grievances that led to armed conflict have not changed. Structural violence is intensifying at an alarming rate. Nepal has not addressed the wounds, and scars caused by the armed conflict. The significant human rights violation cases still go unaddressed. Nagarik Aawaz works for a Just and Peaceful Nepal and feels that youth and women are key to realizing the goal. We invest in and provide space for women and youth to be transformative peace leaders. These transformations are personal, psychological, social, and cultural in nature. Transformed youth and women have the ability to challenge discriminatory structures. They challenge both the large and small structures that promote violence. We design our programs/initiatives to promote the idea of peace in each community. Communities are the owners of these programs. Only community people can keep peace going.

In 2021, our world experienced the impacts of Climate Change like never before! Tangible infrastructural destructions, and loss of homes, livelihoods, and precious lives could be counted and named. Message from the C.E.O

Still, the world is dealing with the multidimensional crisis of COVID-19 which is going beyond to public health crisis only. It has taken the physical and social life of humankind in a different way. The global world is not finding the shortcut solution for this, as the impact of COVID-19 has been creating multifaceted uncertainties in everyone's daily life and also has drastically increased the demand side of communities in an extraordinary way.

As a peacebuilding organization, Nagarik Aawaz felt the deeper consequences of the pandemic and has been trying to address these unprecedented demand side of communities by integrating a peacebuilding approach within its responses/ action, and the feeling of urgency to act. Nagarik Aawaz has always been aware of the reality that if community demand grows in a multifaceted way, it will have a significant impact on supply, exacerbating preexisting grievances, structural inequalities, and violence, as in this type of adverse situation, power dynamics play around within the privileged, and only power-holders will have access to supply-side. To mitigate these impacts, we mobilized our partner groups, peace ambassadors, women peace facilitators, and other allies, and tried to listen to the unheard voices, first taking care of their own emotional well-being. Then we activated them in the communities using a combination of all available resources: human, financial, knowledge, and skills, so that we could optimize these resources to their maximum potential and serve the people who are supposed to be excluded from the wider supply chain. Still, we must invest in this area and build these kinds of local peace infrastructures so that our communities may thrive even with minimal interference from outside communities and continue to contribute.

With the financial support of Focus Women Foundation, Switzerland. Women Living with Dignity was a year-long program that began in January 2021 and ended in December 2021. The program has now been extended for another year. A total of 30 conflict-affected women of different age groups are the participants of the program in Lalitpur and Nawalpur. The project was designed as an outcome of Dr Susan Risal's PhD thesis (CEO of Nagarik Aawaz).

This project intends to support women affected by violence and armed conflict to live a dignified life ensuring their psychological, physical and economic wellbeing. Furthermore, this program helps to promote leadership in communities by advocating for peace and security agendas. The program focuses on providing safe space, medical support, psychosocial care, socioeconomic support to women that will help them gain self-confidence and hope for a better future.

Additionally, the project contributes to promoting the general wellbeing and re-establishing the lost identity of victims; preventing revictimization of survivors; and supporting the second generation of conflict-affected women and women who faced violence.









Women leaders in action is a two-year program funded by Foundation for Just Society, USA from January 2021 to December 2022. In this project, we aim to consolidate the process of women's movement building in their search for justice through enhanced skills and knowledge and to supervise their activism. In addition, this project allows women to share their knowledge and expand their networks with other conflict-affected communities through various peace initiatives.

The objective of this project is to build up the leadership capacity of 50 women peace activists and to promote their recognition as community peace leaders within their society and to create a space for them in local decision-making structures. This program has intervened in multiple layers such as mental stability, contextual knowledge (civil rights, restorative justice) and non-cognitive skills, bringing about constructive mobilization and engagement with other stakeholders. Participants in this program receive training on conflict, violence, gender, peacebuilding and psychosocial care. There has been a shift in self-awareness regarding mental health through training on psychosocial care.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, this year has been a difficult year for everyone. The 14 conflict affected women were provided with individual counselling (tele-counselling) during that time period. 340 conflict-affected women from 14 districts received food, medicine, and, for some, support in reviving their small businesses. Although the support was minimal, it was crucial to their immediate mental, and economic stability during that difficult time.











The Deepening Women Peace Table (DWPT) program is being implemented in all seven provinces of Nepal under the financial support of Peace Women Across the Globe (PWAG), Switzerland. This program has been ongoing since July 2018 and is running in its third phase from July 2021 and will run up to December 2023.

This program is a strategic program for Nagarik Aawaz to realize our vision of Just and Peaceful Nepal. It is fundamental in sensitizing institutions to sustain peace and help them understand the dignity and the unheard voices of conflict affected women. Through this program, we are able to inform local federal structures to prioritize women affected by conflict in their resource allocations. Conflict-affected women have been using the Women's Peace Table as a space for healing, venting, and expressing their feelings. This program is distinguished from the other programs as it helps to advocate for transitional justice and create a safe space for conflict-affected women to share their feelings, experiences, and explore their collective strength.

With each passing day, this project becomes more vital as the safe space for women is under threat. In addition, these tables provide an opportunity to inform local representatives about the plight of conflict-affected women in local federal structures.DWPTs are creating such opportunities for conflict affected women with their own leadership.







Financial Partner



Building Leadership for Women, Peace, Security & Equity Program funded by Zivik/ifa aims for a social and cultural establishment of women who faced sexual violence, torture and whose husbands were disappeared in the time of conflict. It does this by shifting the norms and values of violence and gender inequality through the regular engagement of the key stakeholders like local government structures, community groups (men, women and youth) and traditional leaders.Nagarik Aawaz has been implementing this program from March 2020 to December 2022. One of the major concrete contributions of this project is to address the structural violence and gender inequality that women (who faced sexual violence, torture, and whose loved ones were disappeared) are facing from the decade, since armed conflict by bringing these voices to the surface with collective participation and joint effort of the key and central actors into this process to help women to live with the notion of peace, security and equity.

The most unique selling point of the project is our strategy to apply survivor to survivor approach in this program where 40 Women Peace Facilitators who themselves are from conflict-affected backgrounds and will be key actors in reaching out to other 235 women who are the central actors of this program and to take their collective agenda of peace and security by engaging other key and central actors.

Other than that this program will be solely implemented by Women-led organizations which also give a message about women building peace and contributing to peace writ large.














Nagarik Aawaz is implementing this program since April 2017 with the financial support of Misereor, Germany. The program is implemented in the Kanchanpur, Nawalpur and Siraha districts of Nepal. The project is implemented by the partner organization Mukti Nepal in Siraha and the Conflict Victim Single Women Development Center in Kanchanpur. Nagarik Aawaz itself implements the program in Nawalpur. The first phase of the program was implemented in Siraha and Kanchanpur from April 2017 to March 2019. Similarly, the second phase of the program was implemented in one more district, Nawalpur from April 2019 to March 2022. We are currently planning for the extension of the program for a further three years in all three districts.

The main objective of this program is to build and sustain the local capacities for peace at the level of young people/women and community members for social justice, conflict transformation and peacebuilding at large. Local Capacities for Peace aims to build and sustain the local capacities for peace at the level of young people/women and community members for social justice, conflict transformation and peace-building at large.


There is a total of 32 youth peace ambassadors associated with this program. One of the goals of this project is to establish the leadership of all youth peace ambassadors as community peace facilitators. Similarly, this project aims to increase community harmony by carrying out different peacebuilding initiatives. The project also focuses on improved psychosocial awareness in the community by providing orientation and individual counselling services by trained psychosocial counsellors. This program has helped the partner organizations to be recognized as a peacebuilding organization in their communities.











With the financial support of Kurve Wustrow, Germany we have been engaging with conflict-affected and marginalized youths, community groups, and local stakeholders through the project 'Youth For Change' since 2015. The working area for this program will again be Dukuchhap, Chhampi, and Lele of Godavari Municipality from the Southern Lalitpur District.

The major objective of the program is to engage communities and to contribute to promoting an equitable and prosperous society through social cohesion, safety nets, and the strengthening of social and cultural capacities so as to resolve disputes and advance community peacebuilding. Furthermore, the project has been successful in promoting mental health as a powerful tool for peacebuilding. As a result of the learning and experiences of the previous years, the foundations of this project are the creation of safe spaces, the engagement of intergenerational groups, and strengthening women agencies.

Psychosocial counseling is the most important aspect of the youth for change program. We have been educating community groups, youths, school students, instructors, and stakeholders on psychosocial care and mental health. There has been a significant shift in how people perceive the notion and symptoms of psychosocial care, as well as how crucial it is to achieve inner peace and stability. School principals have stated that there has been an improvement in teacher-student relationships, that school dropout has decreased, and that many schools have set aside a separate room for students and instructors to receive counseling services. Another most notable accomplishment of the program is its ability to convince several local government authorities offices in the project areas.

The project has achieved tremendous progress in communities by providing safe spaces for youths and community organizations to communicate their views to decision-makers and the general public, ensuring that they are heard.











Following up on the success of the program Change Makers for Peace and Reconciliation, Germany Nagarik Aawaz designed a follow-up program called Change Makers for Sustainable Peace with financial support from Bread for the World. Nagarik Aawaz has been implementing Change Makers for Sustainable Peace (CMSP) from January 2020 to December 2022. The program is executed in Ikudole, Ghusel, and Devichaur at Lalitpur and Madhyabindu Municipality, Nawalpur (wards 5 and 15). A total of 25 Peace Volunteers and 5 Peace Ambassadors are involved in this program.

The main objective of this program is to establish sustainable peace infrastructures and institutions that are accepted by the communities to help mitigate the growing insecurities and weak institutions. In this program, at least 70% of the planned peace initiatives will be led by youth peace volunteers and Peace Ambassadors (80% are be female). Our youths are among the most influential people in their communities. They are approached by the different community level groups and also by the ward office for programs in the community.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, the CMSP program continued its peace initiatives in Nawalpur and Lalitpur by taking all necessary precautions. Through this program, youths have received training on gender and social inclusion (GESI), conflict violence, women's empowerment, mental health, volunteerism, writing minutes/reports and etc. In addition, the program offers regular counselling sessions to youth and the community individuals from both the districts.











South Asian Young Women Leadership and Mentoring Initiative Phase-II is a continuing initiative to strengthen young women's leadership in South Asia. The community project will again be "Women's access to and control over resources and decision making and dismantling the social norms". The project area will again be Jharuwarasi, Lalitpur. We will now engage ten young women, of which two will be our community young women leaders from phase I, and the rest will be new young women.

The main objective of this program is to increase access and control of girls and women over resources and decision making.


The young women leader (YWL) will work with the community young women leaders (CVWL) to aware the Jharuwarasi community on various issues like gender, sexuality, patriarchy, violence, feminism, women leadership and many more. In Phase II, we will work closely with government agencies since we lacked that in the previous phase.











Led by our founder Rita Thapa, Nagarik Aawaz is planning to build a space to re-story the narratives of armed conflict to preserve the memories of the era for healing, remembrance and learning of the new possibilities of Nepal and beyond. The construction project is located in the Nawalpur district. It was initiated in 2017 and is expected to take its final shape as early as 2025.

With this initiative, NA aims to build a durable peacebuilding entity. This Centre will serve two main functions: 1) space to remember past injustices, heal and learn from Nepal's armed conflict; and 2) also serve as a space in which to facilitate ongoing multi-dimensional peacebuilding efforts & learning within Nepal, in the region, and even worldwide. This memorial-learning center will serve multiple functions to help conflict survivors. It will help them honour their loss, heal their wounds, learn from their strengths, and help them lead a dignified life. There will be a much-needed forum for the discussion of injustices, as well as a place for remembrance and healing. The PBM&LC will allow existing communities and future generations to learn about the past and make long-term commitments for a peaceful future. It will be a vibrant space that connects to other peace centers in the region as well as internationally.

Furthermore, the center will serve as a knowledge center for peacebuilding, learning and research, a safe space for conflict-affected communities and peace builders to heal, learn and collaborate, and a place for people from different backgrounds to find common ground.

Nagarik Aawaz developed Padmalaya through a process-driven approach. We were able to mix the physical construction of this center with social features as well as natural aspects. As a result, we've implemented three community peacebuilding programs to foster community ownership while also making the Padmalaya vernacular and climate-sensitive. We have a working team of ten people in the district. We have completed an outdoor kitchen, a community training hall, a service block (adhoc program team space), and have started construction on a five-story building that will hold a water tank and other water management facilities.



Other Highlights

Covid Relief Support

The COVID-19 pandemic has made this year extremely difficult for all of us. During this time period, the 14 conflicted women received individual counseling (telecounselling). There were 340 conflict-affected women from 14 districts who received food, medicine, and, for some, support in reviving their small businesses. Even though the support was minimal, it was crucial to their immediate mental and economic stability during that difficult time.



Nagarik Aawaz has been working closely with conflict-affected women for over 20 years. The project Deepening Women's Peace Table and Women Leaders in Action introduced to whole new problems faced by sexually tortured women. These women are not recognized by the government and have not received any support from the government. Currently, Nagarik Aawaz provides monetary assistance to 9 women who suffered sexual tortures to help them recover their dignity. Nagarik Aawaz have established a Peace Endowment Fund in order to help women like these. In Nepal, this fund will support initiatives led by young people and women to promote peace.

Nagarik Aawaz Podcast

In 2020, we at Nagarik Aawaz came up with the idea of creating a series of podcasts on various conflict transformation topics in diverse contexts. The idea is to develop an online debate platform. We attempt to examine cross-cutting themes such as peace, gendered language, nonviolence, youth, women, and other groups' movements in Nepal.


